Despite her age, Lola is vibrant and still has lots of love to give. She is healthy and fully vetted.





Madame Lola is full of joie de vivre and would be a welcome and wonderful addition to a loving family!







Ask the Trainer

PREPARING YOUR DOG FOR BACK TO SCHOOL TIME

For some of us, the routine doesn't change much over the summer, but for some families, the change is dramatic. Children go back to school, and many companies go back to regular hours after operating on "summer hours." Be aware that not only will you and your children need to get ready for back-to-school routine changes, so will your dog.

Dogs generally aren't big fans of change, and it is easy to overlook the impact of a sudden change in routine on our dogs – especially if they are very young or very old.

The following are some suggestions for how to make things easier for your dog:

- 1. Try to practise your new routine before it starts. Help your dog begin to adjust to the changes by easing them into it. Encourage your kids to set their alarm and get up earlier instead of sleeping in.
- Take your dog out for walks and/or bathroom breaks at the same time you will on school days.
- 3. If their meal times changed over the summer, adjust them back to the normal routine.
- 4. Start practising leaving them alone for longer periods of time. If you have crated your dog in the past during work or school hours, you may need to brush up on cratetraining routines.
- 5. Plan extra exercise in the mornings and evenings. Be prepared to adjust

the size of meals if your dog will be getting less exercise during the school year.

- 6. Start preparing your dog for being gated off from areas of the house while they are alone. Chewed furniture and relapses in house training can be signs of boredom or anxiety.
- 7. Find ways to keep your dog engaged while they are left alone. Many dogs will just sleep, but I keep puzzle toys, tricky treat balls, and frozen Kongs available so my younger dogs aren't bored when I'm away from the house.
- Consider leaving the radio or TV on so your dog has some background noise.
- 9. Consider hiring a reputable dog walker to come and let your dog out midday. Most dogs struggle to hold their bowel and bladder for seven hours or longer. If you have a dog walker but were on "holiday" from that routine during the summer, get the routine of the dog walker restarted as soon as possible.
- Stay calm during all leavings and returns. Don't make leaving the house or returning a major event.

Many dogs adjust well, but young dogs and elderly dogs, especially dogs with some cognitive decline, can struggle with sudden shifts in routine, so be prepared to ease them into the new normal.

Finally, there is the belief that "a tired dog is a good dog." This is a piece of advice that annoys me no end, as we tend to overdo it and exhaust our dogs. An exhausted dog will have a harder time coping with stress if they are anxious.



Exercise is important, but you don't need to exhaust your dog. Also, routinely exhausting a dog runs the risk of building his endurance, and then you have a dog who needs more and more exercise.

Back to school time is a change for many of us. Even once we're grown and our children are grown, the end of summer often motivates us to change our routine and get "back on track." Let's make it as easy on our dogs as we can.
















SHARE YOUR FALL FUN WITH US!
