

She sleeps in her crate at night and will seek it out at bedtime. She is not destructive when left alone and travels well in the car.



Be honest with yourself and the rescue

It's natural to want to put your best foot forward, but honesty is the best policy. If you sometimes work long hours or aren't confident about dealing with certain behaviours, don't be afraid to say so to the adoption coordinator. It can also be tempting to help the dog who seems most in need, but you won't be helping anyone if you're unprepared and overwhelmed.

What might be right for some might not be right for you

Well-meaning family and friends may want to steer you to dogs of a particular breed or age, but try to focus on finding the right dog for your family and lifestyle, including your current pets. The adoption coordinator, the resources provided here, and this newsletter's

trainer articles are good sources of factbased information.

Be open minded

You may well have a particular breed, size, sex, age, or colour in mind, but try to stay open minded. Sometimes the right dog is the one you least expect!

Don't overlook the seniors

Many think you can only form a lasting connection with a puppy or young dog, but there are thousands of happy families out there who beg to differ! Many senior dogs are active and up for adventure, and all are ready to settle in and feel the love – and give all that love back and then some.

Consider fostering

If you're unsure about what kind of dog might best suit your family, consider fostering. You'll have the opportunity to live with different dogs and gain incredible insights – and help dogs in

need. Meet-and-greets are invaluable, but spending time with some "right" dogs (and even some "wrong" ones) will help you recognize your perfect match when he or she comes along. Fostering is a very rewarding experience, and if you adopt a dog-friendly dog, you'll likely want to keep being a foster family.


Dear Speaking of Dogs Rescue,

She's never had any behavioural issues at all. She's possibly the sweetest dog in the world and has been easy to train. Our bulldog's nose was out of joint for a few weeks, but Sarabi really didn't care, so he gave up. Now they are very much a team and always go where the other is and occasionally play together.

Initially when we called our bulldog in a big voice she would cower and become nervous; she took time to trust my husband, but thankfully, within the last few months, she's come to realize that he isn't going to hurt her and now seeks his affection, which my husband is ecstatic about.





