CHIHUAHUA SMALL, SENIOR, FEMALE









## **Ask the Trainer**

#### "YOU KNOW BETTER!"

Have you ever had someone assume the worst about you? You do your best, and they berate you for not doing better?

That was my experience last week with my family. I know they care about me, but it's just so upsetting when they are so kind one moment and then make me feel so defensive the next.

My family likes to sit around on the couch in the living room in the evening and watch TV. That's how it's always been. Everyone has a good time, sharing snacks and laughing at the TV shows.

This morning I went into the living room and sat on the couch. There was a gentle sun beam hitting just the right spot, and it was so warm and lovely and comfortable.

Suddenly, my dad stormed into the room.

"You know better! Get off!"

He freaked me out, so I hunkered down, looked away, and stayed quiet. I was afraid to get off the couch because he was coming right for me.

He pointed right at me and hissed "DOWN!"

That was pretty scary, so I tried to make myself even smaller. I even rolled over onto my back. I figured everyone knows that means I'm not a threat, that I mean no harm. How much clearer could I be that I didn't want to fight with him?

But then he grabbed at my neck, and that was just too much for my frayed nerves. I snapped my teeth toward his arm and made the scariest noise I could muster!

He pulled his hand back and raised his voice even more.

"BAD DOG!"

I really didn't want to fight with him, so I flattened my ears, darted my eyes around, licked my lips, and slithered off the couch, leaving the room.

I'm thankful that he left me alone after that, but I don't understand why he would do that to me. All I was doing was enjoying a comfortable sunny morning in the living room.

I heard him say to my sister that I tried to fool him by rolling on my back. He said I wanted a belly rub, and how dare I trick him into almost being bitten. He said "I knew better."

That scenario happens in homes across Canada every day. But what can it teach us?

#### Dogs Aren't People

As humans, we choose to bring dogs into our home, but we don't always treat them like the different species they are. We may think of our pets as family, but they're not people. Attributing spiteful motivations to our dogs is an all too common fallacy, and it can harm our relationships with and understanding of them.

#### We Have Different Languages

The dog in our scenario was simply doing what dogs do – sleeping in a comfortable location that smells like her family. Her perspective was likely something along the lines of "How on earth could I know better? Doesn't everyone sit in the softest, most comfortable place in the living room?"

The owner accused his dog of tricking him, but she was using the only language she knows and, from her point of view, was communicating very clearly that she didn't want any conflict. (What dog would want a belly rub from someone who was acting irrational and scary?)

There was no conflict until her owner became aggressive, which provoked a defensive response.

In the end, the dog didn't learn to stay off the furniture, but she did learn that humans can be unpredictable and scary and that they don't respect gestures of appearement, like rolling on her back.

## It's Important to Understand Everyone's Motivation

Assuming the worst of our dogs sets us up to respond at best unhelpfully and at worst aggressively. Assuming a dog is acting out of spite or anger never provides a clear training roadmap that can resolve the problem at hand.

If the owner in our scenario had understood that his dog was simply seeking comfort (and not being rebellious or stubborn), he would have been able to teach his dog to stay off the furniture and would not have provoked any aggression.

For example, he could have called the dog off the couch with a previously trained cue, like "come" or a hand touch. With the dog off the furniture, he could then have prevented access to this preferred sleeping spot while training an alternative behaviour, such as resting on a dog bed that is beside the couch.

## We All Have Wants and Needs – Even Dogs!

Our dogs are far more flexible than many of us realize. If we teach them appropriate behaviour in a way they can understand, everyone will be happy and fulfilled.







That said, regardless of how much training they receive, dogs will always need to do dog things, like sleeping in comfy spots, digging holes, chewing things, running, and seeking and finding treasures.

If you don't want your dog to dig in the garden, provide them with a digging pit. If you don't want your dog to sleep on the furniture, given them comfortable beds in prime locations. If you don't

want your dog to chew shoes, give them plenty of toys – you can even hide some around the house so they can go on treasure hunts!

#### Dogs Only Know What They're Taught

Our dogs don't "know better" until we teach them. Expecting them to figure out – or innately know – all our rules without providing specific guidance is not fair to them, and it never results in getting the preferred behaviour.

To a dog, our rules are arbitrary and nonsensical. It's up to us to set them up for success and teach them with kindness and understanding.

Saying "No!" or "Bad dog," poking your dog, throwing things at them, or making loud noises is not training. The only thing your dog will learn is that you can sometimes be really scary and confusing.

When your dog does something you don't like, pause for a moment. Did you teach them to do a different behaviour? Have you motivated then sufficiently to maintain these lessons? Do they have unmet needs that they are seeking to fulfill on their own? This will put you on the path to encouraging the behaviour you want and developing the best possible relationship with your dog.


If you're not sure how to train your dog, consult a trainer certified in positive training methods, such as the ones who contribute to this newsletter.

Remember: your dog is a dog and you control their destiny. What else can they do but dog things? How else can they communicate but in dog language?
