Why Time Is Not of the Essence with Rescues



According to the *Oxford English*Dictionary, "time" is the most used noun in the English language. Humans are obsessed with time and deadlines, and this can actually impair our rescue pets.

The 3/3/3 Rescue Rule

The human need for deadlines makes the 3/3/3 Rescue Rule so enticing. It provides a timeline to rate a rescue dog's adjustment and gives new guardians an idea of when they should expect particular changes.

According to the 3/3/3 rule, as a new guardian, you should expect that after

three days you're new dog won't be as scared and will want to interact. Then at three weeks, the expectation is for the dog's personality to start to come out, and you will start seeing a lot of behaviours: the good, the bad, and the ugly. Then after three months, your dog will be completely at home, completely trust you, and your life together will really start.

However, this scenario just isn't realistic. Each dog is an individual who comes with their own experiences, needs, and

ball, and putter around. Someone who is retired or works from home would be ideal as he really enjoys human companionship.







preferences. It's just not fair to put a general timeline on rescues.

What if your dog doesn't come out from under the table by day three? Or what if your rescue is not comfortable in their environment and is still very skittish to noise after three months? What if your dog never has any issue and is just happy go lucky right from the start? Will you be waiting for some weird behaviour to pop out at the three-week mark?

One Rule Doesn't Fit All

These sorts of timelines can set you and your rescue up for unnecessary stress and struggle. You may start to panic or stress because things are taking longer than they "should," and you may try to rush your dog into situations that they're not ready for thinking they'll "get over it." Or you may ignore behaviours that really need to be addressed because you think they're just part of the acclimatization process.

Instead of putting your rescue on a timeline, work within your dog's own acclimation process. Here are some key points to help your dog feel more at home and build your relationship:

Decompression Time

- We are so excited to introduce our new addition to friends and family, but it is best to hold off until your dog has had time to learn about their new home and immediate environment
- In the beginning, walks should be kept short and you should walk the same route until you can see your dog's confidence build.

- Focus on mental enrichment rather than physical exercise because this will help your dog relax and build confidence. Search for "brain games for dogs" and you will see a ton!
- Learn about dog body language and subtle signs of stress so you can help your dog through situations, create positive associations, and recognize the signs when your dog is truly confident.

Building Trust

- Body language is also a big part
 of building trust. Knowing the signs
 of when a dog wants to be pet or not
 or when a dog needs space is key to
 building trust in the beginning.
- Allow your dog to initiate contact. They'll do it when they're ready.
- Give your dog space. If they are eating or sleeping, avoid petting or initiating close contact.
- Quiet praise and lots of rewards when your dog does something you like will go a long way!

Teach Confidence-Building Skills

- Teach your dog to target your hand so that you can redirect their attention and move them off furniture or away from something without handling them. It's a fun and easy trick to teach!
- Rewarding eye contact is another great skill that will be really helpful when you're out and about in your neighbourhood. When your dog looks to you, give them a tasty treat!
- "Relax on a mat" is a great skill to give both of you space when needed

- (such as when you're cooking, eating dinner, or working), and it helps your dog to learn to relax when they may feel overwhelmed or too excited.
- Sniffing is a dog's way of learning about the world, and it also promotes calmness. Play sniffing games such as sprinkling something yummy in the grass or around your house and have your dog search it out.

Working with your dog and not within a deadline will make this journey a positive one for both of you and create an everlasting, trusting bond.

My company, EduCanine, created a wonderful program called "The Rescue Plan" that addresses decompression, how to read your dog for signs of stress, how to create a safe environment inside and outside, and important skills to teach your dog to navigate their new world. 


























Adoption Update
