## TO GREET OR NOT TO GREET... THAT'S A GOOD QUESTION!



As I was walking with my 10-year-old son, I noticed three instances where people were allowing their dogs to meet on leash, and most dogs did not look impressed. I thought to myself, "What if I made my son say hello to each person we walked by?" So I asked him, "What would you think if I said you had to say hello to every kid who walked by you?" He squished up his nose and looked at me as if I had grown another head. "Why would I want to do that?" he responded.

Is my son antisocial? Does he have trouble making friends? Or does he perhaps not want friends? Not at all! In fact, you would probably raise an eyebrow if you watched someone say hello to every person they walked

by. If we don't expect humans to say greet to every stranger, why do we ask it of our dogs?

Many dogs, especially once they have passed the puppy stage, are not keen to say hello - not all, but many. We need to respect their social preferences.

### Look for the Subtle Signs

Leashed greetings can be very uncomfortable for dogs because:

- We usually have them greet face to face, which is not polite for dogs
- They are constrained on a leash, and they know they can't go anywhere if things go sideways

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### **Ask the Trainer**

- We human may miss the subtle signs that indicate the dogs aren't really interested in greeting, such as:
  - o A tongue flick
  - o Looking away
  - o Quickly sniffing the ground

### And Look for the Not-So-Subtle Signs

If our dogs are trying to politely say that they aren't interested in greetings and we keep pushing them to do so anyway, then the subtle signs will escalate to more overt ways of saying "no thank you." These can include:

- A hard stare at the other dog
- Getting stiff
- Showing teeth (which we sometimes can't see on a walk)
- Raising their hackles
- Growling
- Lunging
- Barking
- Biting

### You Got Your Dog's Back!

You may feel that you are being rude to strangers who try to approach you, but it is so important to advocate for our dogs and avoid putting them in an uncomfortable situation (unless absolutely necessary, such as a vet visit).

If you ignore the signs and continue to force undesired encounters on your dog, then you

risk your dog exhibiting escalated behaviors. To put it another way, would you rather risk offending a couple of strangers or risk having a leash-reactive dog?

With so many dogs out and about now, you may not have a choice but to greet another dog. Perhaps someone's dog is coming up to you, pulling their person like they are on a dog sled. Or perhaps you didn't notice the person coming up behind you to say hello. Not to mention the instances of off-leash dogs running amok that have become common place these days.

### **Gracefully Avoid a Greeting**

So what's a discerning dog and their owner to do? If someone approaches with their dog on leash and your dog isn't receptive, you can simply say:

- •"I'm sorry, I have a new rescue and she needs some space."
- "My dog isn't feeling well, and I don't know if it's contagious."
- "My dog isn't good with leashed greetings."

If they have approached you on a sneak attack, adopt the 3-second rule. This involves counting to three in your head and then getting your dog out of there. It is generally only after three seconds that things go awry.

You can also teach your dog the

cue "Let's go!" to follow you.
Teach and practise this cue - it is really useful! Here is a good video that explains things nicely: <a href="https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=Eo-L2qtD7MQ">https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=Eo-L2qtD7MQ</a>

And what if you encounter an off-leash dog? Take a handful of treats or kibble and throw it right in the dog's face. This normally gives you enough time to use your "Let's go!" cue and get out of there.

Don't feel bad that your dog isn't the neighbourhood greeter or that you might look like a "snob." What's important is that you show your dog, on a regular basis, that you have their back and they can just walk away without getting upset. A simple "Let's go!" that you make fun and reinforcing can help get you and your dog out of difficult situations.

And now that you know how to navigate greeting in a way that's comfortable for you and your dog, get out there and enjoy that summer sunshine!

She is very well behaved for a pup and has not been destructive in any way at the foster home. She is not yet fully housetrained but is almost there. She knows what she is supposed to do outside, but has not figured out how to tell us she needs to go out but as long as she is taken out regularly there are no accidents. She was apparently pee pad trained as a puppy so she just needs a bit more time. The fosters have not had accidents in over 2 weeks now!

Luna is very happy to amuse herself with her toys but if you want to play fetch, she will happily play with you. She also likes to play tug, in an appropriate manner. Luna is a very cuddly girl. Loves snuggling up. She sleeps nestled in your legs all night. She makes cute little sounds of contentment when she is pet while lying next to you. Luna has a hound howl. She will howl if she meets another dog and tries to get them to play, however once they are playing, she stops.

When you leave she will initially bark and howl but it's quite manageable and doesn't last long. She would love to have a family that is home more than not, if possible.

Luna needs some leash training; she gets so excited on walks and pulls but she is smart and learns quickly. Luna has excellent recall at the foster home who live on a large, fenced property. When she is on the far side of the property and they call her, she runs happily right to them!

Although Luna currently has the company of other dogs, we believe she would be just as happy to be an only dog as long as she gets time to play fetch.






POODLE (TOY) SMALL, SENIOR, MALE



Yellow Labrador Retriever / MIXED LARGE ADULT MALE


