# Ask the Trainer:

# Dog Sports; Good for the Mind, **Body, and Behaviour**



Sometimes I liked to dance to music in the living room, and my dog, not understanding what I was doing, would hump me. This was Galaxy's way of saying she wanted to join in the fun, but she didn't know how. So, I taught Galaxy "middle," where she pops through my legs. She loved this little exercise so much, I decided to investigate more moves we could add, and voila – we have our own little dance routine! This is similar to the dog sport freestyle, which "is a modern dog sport that is a mixture of obedience training, tricks, and dance that allows for creative interaction between dogs and their owners" (Wikipedia).

I teach agility and dog parkour classes, which Galaxy loves, but she has a particular sparkle when we do our freestyle together. When I dance, she weaves through my legs, moves forward and backward at my hip, and spins. We are sloppy and certainly not ready for our competitive debut, but it's our own fun activity, and humping is no longer in Galaxy's repertoire of moves. It was a fun way to eliminate an annoying behavior.

I've also found that sporting activities have greatly improved my fearful and reactive dog's behaviour and overall demeanour. I often see

focus, a higher level of confidence, and less reactivity both inside and outside the home. I think this happens for a number of reasons. In sports, your dog can choose whether they want to do things. Sporting activities are for fun so, if your dog isn't into it, then you don't have to do it! Sports also give your dog something new and interesting to focus on, providing excellent mental and physical enrichment outside your normal routine, which is novel and exciting. Humans also really enjoy seeing their dogs accomplish new skills, so the endorphins are flowing on both ends of the leash!

Attending a class is not necessary

– most of the dogs I work with
wouldn't be able to handle a class!
COVID has, however, given us
access to many online tutorials, so
you can start looking into what sport
might make your dog's eyes sparkle

– right in the comfort of your
own home.

# Here's an overview to get you started:

### **Dog Agility**

This sport focuses on obstacles and running through a course smoothly and quickly. It includes jumps, tunnels, weave poles, an A-frame, ramps, and more. It requires a lot of equipment, which you can buy online to create your own courses at home or even make yourself if you're handy. The American Kennel Club has a great article that explains how to create your own home agility activities.

Agility is best for dogs 2 years and up who don't have any physical issues that could be aggravated. If

you are unsure, talk to your vet or a trainer. If you'd like to know more about agility training and competitions in your area, check out your local trainers to see if you can join a class.

## Dog Parkour

This is a great activity that you can do anywhere! It's similar to agility, but your obstacles are simply found in your environment rather than a dedicated course, and you teach skills such as two paws up, balance, over, under, through, and more. Learning this sport will change your walks forever! See if your local training centres offer parkour, or you can also learn online by visiting dogparkour.org.

# Freestyle

This is the fun activity that I mentioned above, and you can be really creative with it! Freestyle is a dance-like sport where you can add simple heeling steps, weaving through legs, and even some fun recall exercises — anything goes, and your dog won't even realize they are learning typical obedience work. WagWalking.com offers a nice introduction to the sport, including some videos.

# **Sheep Ball**

This is such an awesome game for herding dogs and dogs who like to be a goal tender. The object of the game is to simulate herding and organizing. The ball stays on the ground, and the dog's role is to be the goalkeeper or organizer. It's different from fetch because there is an end goal to the game, which can be very satisfying for many dogs. And it's a really easy activity – like soccer for dogs! To learn more, go to learningaboutdogs.com.

Adding an activity that both you and your dog love to do together is a great way to strengthen your bond, so you get to know your dog on an even deeper level and provide them with even more enrichment – both physically and mentally. It's a win-win situation for you and your dog, helping to encourage behaviours and focus.












Poodle (Toy)








